Year 2009 proved to be a year of copious challenges and blessings for Bataan Peninsula State University. These challenges and blessing signaled the members of the BPSU community that it was time to be conscious of its accomplishments as well as the improvements to be made in its four mandates: Instruction, Research, Extension and Production.

After setting the plans for each office and college in the University, members of the BPSU community proceeded to push through with the implementation of its programs and accomplish its objectives. In the area of Instruction, the University sought to implement more stringent policies in order to improve the faculty profile and also to comply with the standards set by the Commission on Higher Education. In comparison to the figures presented in the previous Annual Report, the number of qualified instructors for 2009 was relatively higher with almost 1.21% increase in the number of faculty with Master's degree and 1.23% increase in the number of faculty with doctoral degree. With regard to faculty rank, the University still has to exert effort to increase the number of faculty with professorial positions. Five (5) new programs were added to the list of curricular offerings of the University. Furthermore, the accreditation of the fourteen (14) curricular programs of the University was sought. Out of these fourteen programs, three were granted with Level II Accreditation while the rest of the programs were declared gualified for the Level I Accreditation Survey Visit. The agricultural programs of the BPSU Abucay Campus underwent NAFES Accreditation which led to the declaration of the BPSU-Abucay Campus as Provincial Institute of Agriculture. Top disciplines in terms of enrollment and graduation are (1) Medical and Allied Discipline; (2)

Engineering and Architecture; (3) Business Administration and Related Disciplines; (4) Education Science and Teacher Training, (5) Trade, Craft and Industrial Disciplines; and (6) IT-Related Disciplines. Aside from ensuring students the access to quality education through providing student scholarships and financial assistance, some students were given the opportunity to take their practicum or on-the-job training at international companies.

The Research culture in the University continued to flourish as more faculty members showed interest in getting involved in conducting researches. Funds were made available to support the researchers and to ensure the sustainability of research projects. In terms of number, majority of the researches conducted in 2009 are Agriculture-related followed by researches on Social and Behavioral Sciences. Researches generated by faculty continue to be presented in local, regional, national and international conferences. Some, due to the benefits granted to the community like the preservation of Filipino culture and enhancement of agri-industry through the utilization of modern technology, were given funding by national agencies. Three (3) agricultural researches were also presented in an international conference in Thailand. The Research and Development Office also continues to publish monographs of completed researches and applied at the IPR office for the patenting of these researches. Although the number of faculty researchers

increased for this year, the University still has to implement new strategies in order to motivate the others, especially those with associate professor ranks, to venture into researches.

In terms of community extension, the University was able to provide extension programs categorized under Social and Behavioral Sciences, Engineering and Technology, Health and Related Discipline, and Agriculture and Natural Resources. From January to December 2009, the Office of Extension Services (OES) was able to conduct sixty-five (65) extension projects to the nearby communities. Out of these 65 extension programs, the University was able to train 3,850 individuals. Majority of the extension programs conducted in 2009 fall under the area of skills and livelihood and health. The University also forged partnerships with international organizations and such led to the conduct of extension and outreach project in Bani Elementary School. Likewise, the large impact brought about by Sa Kabukilan, a program of BPSU Radyo Vatan, received funding from the NCCA because of its noble intention of raising the awareness of the Filipinos on the preservation of the cultural arts of the Magbukon Aeta community.

With regard to the assets of the University, the consolidated income from the IGPs amounted to Php4,420,598.25. Such income was used to augment the budget of the University. There was also an increase in the number of IGPs as the University acquired a 10-hectare fishpond and also sought the establishment of the BPSU Orani Hostel.

Likewise, seventeen (17) infrastructure projects were completed in 2009 in order to further improve the operations of the University. Some offices were relocated in order to make communication and delivery of services more efficient and more effective. New infrastructures were also established in the campuses of the University to ensure the safety of the students and to make the area more conducive for learning. Moreover, the completion of the training center in BPSU Abucay was pursued as it can serve as a practical venue for trainings, workshops and meetings. The Banana Tissue Culture Laboratory was also completed this year to fast track the development of the research capabilities of the students.

The leadership of the OVPAF was transferred to the concurrent Vice President for Research, Extension and Auxiliary Services due to the retirement of VP Villar. For 2009, the University's workforce totaled to 796 employees of which 500 are members of the faculty and the remaining 289 are part of the non-teaching workforce. In terms of the profile of the non-teaching personnel, the number of permanent employees is larger than the number of contractual, casual, and job order employees.

Under the Office of Administrative Services, the University was able to implement the Citizen's Charter by the month of September as compliance to the policies of the Civil Service Commission and provisions in the Anti-Red Tape Act of 2007. Placing high regard for the welfare and protection of all the members of the BPSU community, the OAS spearheaded the planning on the development of emergency groups in every campus.



Curriculum Revisions and Additions

Three new programs were added to the list of curricular offerings of the University in 2009. The addition of such programs were recommended by the University and approved by the Board of Regents as such programs are perceived to foster prosperity in the province through the utilization of its natural resources. Moreover, other programs were offered as response of the University to the current and future concerns of the community.

During the Board Meeting held on 13 July 2009 at the Commission on Higher Education, new curricular programs were approved by the Board of Regents. Hence, on the first semester of AY 2009-2010, the Bachelor of Science in Tourism was offered at the Main Campus. The offering of the program was made possible by Board Resolution No. 13-a series of 2008.

The Bachelor of Science in Social Work was also among the new curricular programs approved for offering by the Board of Regents. The program will be housed at the College of Social and Behavioral Sciences and shall be the second program offering of the said college after the BS Psychology. The program is expected to produce licensed social workers, CHED Commissioner and BPSU Board of Regents Chair, Dr. Nona S. Ricafort underscored as in demand profession in the years to come.

The University also pursued its consortium with the Bataan School of Fisheries in order to offer the Bachelor of Science in Fisheries program.

The offering of the course was the University's initial step for the proposed establishment of the Aqua-Marine Research Center in the town of Orani. The Associate in Accounting Technology was proposed by Faculty Regent Evelyn S. Tria, who is a certified public accountant, seeing the program as ladderized to a bachelor's degree in accountancy.

Through Board Resolution No. 31, series of 2009, the University is also granted the permission to offer the BS Development Communication program. The program shall be housed under the College of Arts and Sciences. The offering of the program is expected to bring about positive social change especially to developing communities.

Accreditation

Accreditation, in its simplest sense, is a means of promoting educational excellence and therefore entails prestige to the University. In its noblest desire to secure a brighter future for its students, the University sought the accreditation of its curricular programs. As pronounced by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) and the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP), accredited programs do not only bring prestige to the University but such will also help in identifying the strengths and weaknesses of the curricular programs.

NAFES Accreditation

On 18 March 2009, a group of the National Agriculture and Fisheries Education System (NAFES) program evaluators visited the Abucay Campus to evaluate whether the University meets the standards of the Commission on Higher Education in terms of institutional profile, instruction, physical facilities, research and extension.

Although the University garnered a high score from the evaluation, the accreditors

commented that further improvements should be made on the faculty profile, laboratories, research facilities, and auxiliary services. Likewise, their findings also showed that the University needs to exert more efforts in conducting researches that would have bigger and more significant impact on the community.

With such high results, the Commission on Higher Education, through Memorandum Order No. 32, series of 2009 dated 16 September 2009, identified the BPSU Abucay Campus as a provincial institute for Agriculture. As an identified PIAF, the Abucay Campus shall receive prioritization with regard to CHED development projects in agriculture. The University shall also be granted with Php 500,000 every year, which it can allocate for either of the several priority projects – all based on approved NAFES policies, plans and implementing guidelines.

Accreditation of the Fourteen (14) Curricular Programs

As a result of the Survey Visit conducted by the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines (AACCUP), Inc. last August and September 2009, the Bataan Peninsula State University has fourteen (14) programs with Candidate

Status for Level I Accreditation. With a high rating garnered by the Bachelor of Science in Electrical Engineering under the College of Engineering and Architecture and two programs from Abucay Campus namely Bachelor of Science in Agriculture and Bachelor of Secondary Education, these three programs may apply for the Level I Survey Visit in March 2010.

In pursuit of further proving the University's proficiency to meet the standards for higher education institutions, another batch of program offerings consisting of the BS Industrial Technology, BS Nursing, and Bachelor in Secondary Education underwent the Second Survey Visit on December 10-12, 2009.

Higher education institutions, especially universities, are required to meet the policies implemented by the Commission on Higher Education (CHED) that seventy five (75%) of the curricular programs must be accredited. At present, Bataan Peninsula State University has three programs with Level II accreditation and fourteen (14) with Candidate Status for Level I accreditation.

Undergoing accreditation is not only to comply with the standards set by CHED but also to provide assurance to the clients that the curricular programs offered in the University meet or even exceed the national and international standards.

Admission

For the Academic Year 2009-2010, the number of applicants for admission summed up to 5,053 which was lower compared to the number of applicants for admission for AY 2008-2009. Such decline in the number of applicants for AY 2009-2010 may be attributed to the growing number of schools offering tertiary education in the province. The socioeconomic status of the applicants is also considered to have a great significance on the decrease in the number of applicants for 2009. The actual number of applicants who took the admission test on the given schedule is actually 4,063.

Due to the University's willingness to give consideration, others were allowed to take the admission test even after the admission period.

Data on Freshman Admission for AY 2009-2010 show that the Main Campus continues to have the most number of applicants. In terms of the applicant's course preference, Table 4 shows that engineering and technology courses continue to be the top choices of the applicants while IT-related disciplines have surpassed the number of applicants who preferred trade, craft and industrial courses. Ranking third are the curricular programs offered in the College of Arts and Sciences.

Such growth in the number of applicants was brought about by the offering of the Bachelor of Science in Hotel and Restaurant Management, Bachelor of Science in Tourism Management and the extension of the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program in the Main, Orani, Dinalupihan and Bagac campuses.

Enrollment


Shown in Table 5 is the number of enrollees in the various campuses of the University including the number of enrollees in the other state colleges and universities with which BPSU established consortium.

The Main Campus continues to have the biggest number of enrollees, followed by

the Balanga, Orani, Dinalupihan, Abucay Campuses and the extension campus in Bagac.

Table 3 reflects the number of applicants and qualifiers. Based on the data provided in Table 3, eighty two percent (82%) of the applicants qualified for the admission test. However, Table 4 shows discrepancy in the data presented as it indicates that the

number of enrollees exceeded the number of qualifiers in the admission test.

Although the admission test serves as the University's strategy in sorting the applicants who possess the ability to meet its standards and expectations, there are still non-qualifiers who were given the favor to enroll due to political intervention.

Likewise, Table 6 reflects the number of enrollees per college per program levelwhile data in Table 7 indicate that the College of Nursing and Midwifery exceeded the enrollment rate in the College of Engineering and Architecture for AY 2009-2010.

In the past years, engineering courses usually had the biggest student population and the medical and allied disciplines only come second. The increase in the number of students at the College of Nursing and Midwifery may be attributed to the increasing demand for specialists in health care in other countries. Likewise, the increase may have been significantly affected by the University's efforts to make the program accessible by duplicating the course in its other campuses.

Table 7 presents the number of enrollees per curricular program for the First and Second Semester of AY 2009-2010. Moreover, it also includes the growth of enrollment It is observable in Table 7 that the number of students in the various programs usually decline during the second semester.

Such is brought about by the failure of students to meet the required grade for the program or to pass the required number of units.

Furthermore, the decline in the Second Semester enrollment may also be brought about by poverty and high cost of education. As for the Second Semester of AY 2009-2010, the enrollment rate dropped by 9.29% thus reducing the number of students from 13, 316 to 12,079.

Graduation

With the passing and approval of the Board of Regents Resolution No. 37, series of 2009 on March 02, 2009, the Bataan Peninsula State University produced 2,875 graduates in 2009, surpassing the previous number of graduates in 2008 by 11.83%. The total number of graduates was generated from 47 curricular programs being offered in five campuses of the University.

Undergraduate programs recorded the highest number with 2,021 graduates. This maybe credited to the fact that as a University, more than 50 % of the curricular offerings of BPSU falls under this category. Data may also be related to the general concept that under fair circumstances, student opts to pursue a bachelor's degree for his/her tertiary education.

Next in rank, the certificate programs have produced 503 graduates, followed by the revised basic education curriculum with 233, certificate programs with 503 and diploma programs with 72 graduates.

Meanwhile, there are 43 students who have completed their academic requirements for the graduate programs while only 2 have finished their post-graduate programs.

As can be gleaned from Table 8, about 47% of the population (942 graduates) came from Balanga Campus (BC). This can be attributed to the fact that the said campus houses the College of Nursing and Midwifery where the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program is originally offered.

As there is towering demand for nurses locally and abroad, the BSN has extended programs in other campuses namely Main, Orani and Dinalupihan.

Moreover, the program is under consortium with two other higher education institutions in Bataan. Extension of program is characterized by offering of the first two years at the Main, Orani and Dinalupihan campuses and consortia while the junior and senior years are completed at the Balanga Campus.

With 20 programs distributed in its six Colleges, the Main Campus ranked second as it yielded a total number of 699 graduates, majority of which came from the College of Engineering and Architecture and the College of Industrial Training. Three other campuses offering both secondary and tertiary education namely Orani, Dinalupihan and Abucay Campus came in rank respectively. Orani Campus has produced 426 graduates, Dinalupihan with 306 and Abucay has recorded 205 graduates.

In terms of discipline, it can be noted that BPSU has successfully responded to the call of intensifying the priority programs of the government. Medical and Allied programs had maintained its highest rank for producing the biggest number of graduates. It is reflected by the 901 Bachelor of Science in Nursing and 41 Midwifery graduates in 2009, accounting to about 33% of the graduates. It was followed by Engineering and Technology with 345 graduates or about 12% of the population. Meanwhile, ITrelated and business administration-related disciplines showed close intervals as they represented the 11% and 10% of the total graduates respectively.

In spite of National Manpower Summit's (NMS) report that there is an excess supply in the number of teachers, education science and teacher training ranked third with a total of 319 graduates. Popularity of the program can be due to the offering of teacher education both for elementary and secondary level in all campuses of BPSU. Conversely, there are only 32 graduates from agricultural discipline notwithstanding the NMS' estimated employment prospects for about 2million workers from 2005-2010. In terms of gender distribution, there are 1,287 male graduates and 1,587 female graduates in 2009 corresponding to a 10% difference in favor of the latter. This is due to a considerable number (633) of female graduates under the BSN program in Balanga Campus.

Specifically, Main and Orani Campus have recorded higher figures of male graduates against the female graduates. Information may be co-related to the disciplines [engineering, craft, trade and industrial technology] being offered in the said campuses.

On the other hand, BC and DC are femaledominated campuses as female graduates comprised 70% and 60% of the total populations of the respective campuses. This may also be attributed to the disciplines available in these campuses like nursing and teacher education.

Finally, Abucay Campus shows a difference of 13 graduates favoring the female population for the Academic Year 2008-2009.

Licensure Examination

Results of licensure examination confirm the University's ability to deliver quality education. With the Commission on Higher Education monitoring the performance of SUCs in licensure examinations, new strategies are being implemented by the University in order to improve its ratings in the board examinations.

Although in 2009, the University was not able to surpass the national passing rates, two (2) of its alumni succeeded and became topnotchers. Miss Roxanne T. Bongco landed the sixth place in the September 2009 Licensure Examination for Teachers (Elementary Level). Mister Romeo C. Tuazon, Jr., presently a member of the faculty of the College of Nursing and Midwifery, scored high and grabbed the 1st place in the November 2009 Midwife Licensure Examination.

Faculty

Faculty Profile

The quality of the teaching workforce is a major consideration in fulfilling the vision, mission, and goals of the University. It is through their capacities and attitude which make it possible for BPSU to provide quality education to the students.

At present, the University has 500 faculty members who continually enable the University to meet its promise to the public of producing professionals who will serve as the prime movers of change in the country.

It can be seen in the succeeding presentations that although the University strives to meet the standards set by the Commission on Higher Education, BPSU still needs to exert extra effort in order to improve the profile of its faculty.

Educational Attainment

It is expected by the Commission on Higher Education that the University will pursue the further improvement of its faculty members in terms of educational attainment. Although the University started to adhere to the recommendation that faculty members must have a master's degree upon entry, Figure 1 shows that 59% are only holders of baccalaureate degree while only 35% meet the minimum requirements for an instructor, and only six percent (6%) are doctoral degree holders.

The number of instructors with baccalaureate degree continues to occupy the largest part of the population of the teaching personnel of the University. This state is brought about by the fact that during the earlier years, especially when BPSU was still a state college, instructors were not yet required to obtain a master's degree upon their entry. Up to the present year, the University is compelled to lower its standards due to the inavailability of qualified applicants for instructor positions in order to prevent shortage on the number of instructors or to prevent overloading the schedules of the other teachers.

The University tries to come up with the solution by encouraging its teaching personnel to pursue advanced studies in their field of specialization. It has also sought partnerships with other organizations that willingly provided scholarship grants to interested faculty. Moreover, University Memorandum No. 328 series of 2009 was also released on 27 July 2009 to remind faculty members to finish their master's degree within three years, as prescribed in the University Code.

Culled from the University's Normative Financing Report for AY 2009-2010, the report presented that in 2008 the University has 317 faculty members with bachelor's degree, 148 with master's degree, and 26 with doctoral degree. In 2009, the number of faculty with bachelor's degree decreased to

Figure 2. Profile of Faculty According to Highest Educational Attainment as of 2009




298 while number of faculty with master's degree, on the other hand, rose from 148 to 178 as some were able to finish their master's degree and the University recruited new instructors who already have master's degree upon their entry.

With regard to the number of faculty with doctoral degree, there was also a slight improvement as the number of faculty with doctoral degree rose from 26 to 31.

Gender

Table 10 shows that the teaching positions in the University are mostly occupied by females. In view of the number of teaching personnel per college, the number of male instructors is most abundant in the College of Engineering and Architecture, while the College of Nursing and Midwifery is dominated by female instructors. The large number of female instructors in the University may be attributed to the fact that although the University tries to deviate from the biases between males and females, the teaching profession continues to be associated with the female gender not only within the premises of the University but also in the outside community.

Although the University always seeks to provide equal employment opportunities to both male and female through removing discriminatory policies and practices, stereotypes on courses continually affect the recruitment and selection process; hence, courses which have been closely associated with males are dominated by male instructors while those subjects associated with the female gender are taught mostly by female instructors.

Age

As reflected in Table 11, majority of the faculty members are aged 29 to 37 years of age. This denotes that the University is comprised of young faculty members. The accreditors from AACCUP commented that having large numbers of young faculty members is a great advantage for BPSU as they can be exposed to several trainings that will further develop their potentials.

Although there is a notion that younger faculty members are more eager to learn and more open to change, the University remains persistent in providing fair opportunities to members of the faculty regardless of age.

Years in Service

The number of years spent by the member of the faculty in the University may be interpreted as faculty's level of job satisfaction. Table 12 reflects the years of service rendered by the faculty members.

The data gathered reveal that 216 or 42% of the faculty members, including the non-teaching employees who were teaching part-time, have rendered services for not more than eight years.

Such is brought about by the University's continuous search for young and qualified faculty members. Furthermore, the growing number of new faculty members also signifies the University's initiative to meet the needs of its growing student population.

At present, the University is attempting to meet the standards set by the Commission on Higher Education regarding the ideal student-teacher ratio.

Tenure

The University's teaching personnel, as shown in Table 13, is composed of 280 permanent, 188 contractual, and 39 parttime faculty members. The Main Campus houses 35% of the total faculty members, with the College of Arts and Sciences having the most number of permanent faculty members and the College of Engineering and Architecture with the most number of faculty with contractual tenure. In the Balanga Campus, the College of Nursing and Midwifery has the most number of faculty with its permanent faculty exceeded by contractual faculty by sixty-six percent (66%). Compared to the other colleges in BC, the College of Education houses the most number of faculty with permanent tenure. Such figures in CNM may be justified with the need for additional faculty to address the growing number of students in the Bachelor of Science in Nursing program. With regard to the Orani, Dinalupihan, Abucay and Bagac campuses, the faculty population is dominated by those with permanent tenure.

Faculty Development

The name of the University depends on the capacity of its educators to deliver quality and relevant education to its students; hence faculty members are constantly encouraged to grab opportunities that would promote professional growth.

Seminars and Trainings

To assure the continuous delivery of excellent quality of education, the University sees to it that its faculty members are exposed to trainings, workshops and conferences that would further enhance their knowledge, skills, and competency level. Similar to the previous years, the University strived to provide equal opportunities to its faculty members in terms of availing opportunities that will motivate them to excel in their field of specialization and to be able to successfully transfer the knowledge to their colleagues and students.

Other than being invited as participants to trainings, some members of the faculty were also tapped by other agencies as resource speakers.

It is through such opportunities that the University proves that even other SUCs or agencies rely on the capacity of the BPSU faculty to provide credible and up-to-date information on their fields of specialization.

With its positive impact on improving the quality of education, attendance to local, regional, national and international seminars, trainings, and conferences are encouraged (see appendices for the list of seminars and trainings attended by faculty).

Dr. Hermogenes M. Paguia's attendance to the MASHAV-sponsored Training

Dr. Hermogenes M. Paguia availed the MASHAV Scholarship Program and attended the one-month training on "R&D of New concept in Integrated Pest Management" on May 4-26, 2009 in Israel.

The training is focused on applying the recently discovered techniques in order to solve issues concerning poverty reduction, food security, sustainable development and community-oriented development. As instructor in Agriculture and Associate Director for Extension Services, this opportunity will both benefit the areas of Instruction and Extension.

Attendance of CEA Faculty to the "in silico medicine-Course on Computational Biology and Biomedical Engineering" Training Course in Osaka, Japan

Dr. John Ryan Dizon, faculty of the College of Engineering and Architecture, attended an intensive training course entitled "in silico medicine – Course on Computational Biology and Biomedical Engineering" on March 8-11, 2009 at the Osaka University in Japan.

The training was provided to masteral and doctoral students and also to young researchers in the different fields of engineering. Twenty participants from seven different countries in the Asia Pacific Region including Japan, Malaysia, Korea, Taiwan, China, Philippines, and Russia were invited to the training. Dr. Dizon was the only representative from the Philippines.

The training focused on the areas of Computational Biology, Computational Biometrics, and Physiome Database. In the lecture for Computational Biology, the trainees were exposed on the various concepts and mathematical methods for modeling biological phenomena ranging from sub-cellular to population level. In the field of Computational Biomechanics, theoretical aspects of the biomechanics of organs, tissues, and cells as well as the methods for simulation analysis/design in the computational biomechanics were discussed.

Biomedical application topics were also given emphasis during this part of the discussion.

Meanwhile, concepts on Physiome Database were discussed in order to expose participants to different strategies that can be used in integrated sciences and bioengineering.

Dr. Dizon believes that BPSU can be on a par with other international universities in terms of modeling of various engineering systems. He also stated in his report that establishing the said engineering systems can lead to additional linkages with respectable international universities; thus, he recommended to President Delfin O. Magpantay to pursue the setting up and the utilization of state-of-the art engineering analysis software in the University.

Presentation of Papers to International Conference

Presentation of Dr. Rolliver M. Baciles' paper to the 2010 Hawaii International Conference on Education

The paper of Dr. Rolliver M. Baciles, Dean of the College of Education, entitled "Predictors of Research Productivity of the Colleges of Education of State Colleges and Universities in Region III" was presented in the Hawaii International Conference on Education on January 7-10, 2010 in Honolulu, Hawaii.

Participation of faculty as presenter in the 31st Annual National Physics Seminar/Workshop Convention

BPSU was once again made proud as another faculty member passed the stringent requirements and criteria of international conferences and events, thereby giving the former the opportunity to present to their counterparts their research.

Mr. Francisco S. Sanchez of the College of Education presented on April 1-4, 2009 his paper during the Philippine Physics Society 31st Annual National Physics Seminar/Workshop Convention held at the Camarines Sur State Agricultural College in Camarines Sur.

Korean Crash Course for ELP Instructors

BPSU continues to pursue its exchange program with its international linkages; hence, in order to bridge the communication barriers between the teachers and students, the University subjected its English instructors to Korean Language Crash Course on May 14-15, 2010 at the CICT Plenary Hall, BPSU Main Campus.

Fifteen faculty members who usually handle the classes of Korean students composed of Mrs. Angela G. Mendoza, Mrs. Cynthia M. Ronquillo, Mrs. Flora D. Canare, Mrs. Normita M. Lugtu, Mrs. Sherrilyn B. Quintos, Miss Noemi E.Legaspi, Miss Lirio C. Baluyot, Mrs. Elizabeth Medairos, Miss Blesilda S. Flores, Mrs. Imelda C. Realce, Mr. Jaime M. Forbes, Mr. Rowell G. De Guia, Mrs. Yolanda Reyes, Mr. Nomer Varua and Dr. Rejun C. Sacdalan attended the course.

Basic Korean phrases and sentences, proper way of writing Hangul, and traditions and history of Korea were taught by Prof. James Choi of the International Institute of Technology and Reformation (IITR).

Faculty Exchange Program

Venturing into exchange programs proved to be worth pursuing. Linkages with national and international academic institutions are continually being pursued by the University.

Apart from conducting collaborative researches with its local and international partners, these linkages have provided funds to sustain the projects of the University.

During their stay at the said school, the administrators of the Bucheon Beauty School sought the opportunity to make revisions on the present curriculum of the Bachelor of Arts in Cosmetology program through the guidance of Mister Macaraeg. President of BBS, Mrs. Park Mi Ok deemed it was necessary to have the Bachelor of Arts in Cosmetology curriculum reviewed and revised so students would have no difficulty in enrolling should they aspire to pursue graduate courses.

Korean Institutions Link with BPSU for Future Exchange Program

Hence, the University is looking forward to extending its programs on TESOL and English Language Proficiency to Gyoung-buk Nursery Teacher Education Center, Ju Hyang Montessori Kindergarten, Sungkyul University, Yeungjin College, Gimcheon University, I Re Tech Co. Ltd., Ox Engineering Co. Ltd, and Han II Girls Middle and High School.

University President Signs MOA with International Academic Institutions during the 2009 Asian University Presidents Forum

Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay attended the 2009 Asian University Presidents Forum on October 19-21, 2009 at Borobudur, Jakarta, Indonesia. The focus of the forum is to secure the capacity of higher education institutions of attaining quality assurance through featuring the best practices of other HEIs in the Asia-Pacific Region.

Aside from being updated on the following top al such as Internal Quality Assurance and Partnership, Quality Control, Student Total Development, Implementation of Quality Assurance System, and Implementation of Quality Control System; President Magpantay was able to forge partnerships with the VIT University in India and Universitas Negeri Jakarta, Indonesia.

As stipulated in the InterUniversity Cooperation Agreement signed by Dr. Magpantay and the presidents of the two universities, BPSU and its new linkages shall both strive to enhance their educational capabilities through initiating academic collaborations in education, research and extension, faculty and student exchange programs, and scholarships.

BPSU Faculty Join AACCUP as Accreditors to Survey Visits in Various SUCs

The University's teaching force continue to aid the Accrediting Agency of Chartered Colleges and Universities in the Philippines by serving as accreditors to various survey visits in several SUCs in Luzon. S. Caracas of the Substitute Financial Assistance under the Faculty Development Program's PGMA-SEGS. Engineer Caracas is currently enrolled as full-time scholar taking up his Engineering Masters at the University of the Philippines in Diliman, Quezon City.

Implementation of Revised Faculty Load Template

After more than three years of implementation, the BPSU Faculty Load Template was finally revised to address the concerns of both the administrators and faculty members.

The modifications were presented by Dir. Emmanuel C. Macaraeg of the Operations, Planning and Development Office during the meeting of the Administrative Council held last November 12, 2009.

One of the salient features of the revised faculty load is the additional table for the faculty's assignments in the other mandates of the University namely research, extension and production. The provision is deemed necessary to properly monitor, and document the additional course works of the faculty members at the same time credit their efforts on discharging functions other than instruction.

To concretize the additional assignments, the template also requests for the title and the source of funding likewise the duration to which the faculty-researcher/extensionist shall be engaging with the reflected project. With such amendment, it is expected that the preparation for the loading shall be well-coordinated among the concerned officials under the OVPAA, OVPSA, VPAF and VPREAS.

As emphasized by Dr. Mercedes G. Sanchez, VP for Academic Affairs, during the said meeting, faculty members shall be allowed to handle at most three (3) different courses every semester. Hence, to maintain the quality of instruction, the template also requires data as to the number of preparations being undertaken by each faculty.

With regard to the teaching loads of the administrators and coordinators, the Council approved the equivalent teaching loads as shwon in Table 16.

Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay approved the suggested new system of faculty loading. The system was immediately implemented during the second semester of AY 2009-2010.

Students

The University targets the holistic development of its students; hence, several programs have been launched to adequately supply the needs of the students and to serve as motivations for them to excel in their chosen field of specialization.

These services were provided upon admission, enrollment and through the entire stay of the students in the University.

With its utmost dedication to serving the students, the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs with its sub-offices was able to accomplish the following:

Admission

Doing its share in promoting the name of the University, the Guidance and Counseling Office conducts school hopping activities and career guidance seminars in order to inform the community on the curricular programs and other services provided by BPSU to its students.

As exhibited in Table 17, it can be claimed that the efforts of the staff of the Guidance and Counseling paid off as they were able to meet the target number of applicants for admission.

Although, the number of applicants for admission decreased by 3% for AY 2009-2010 the University, presumably, still gets the most number of applicants for admission.

Table 17 also reflects that the Main Campus, which houses curricular programs related to Engineering and Technology and Information Technology had the most number of applicants for admission for AY 2009-2010.

Scholarship and Financial Assistance

There are several intelligent and talented students in the Philippines; however, only a small sector of them is assured that they will be able to sustain their studies from their first to their fourth or fifth year.

Bataan Peninsula State University desires to play a big role in national development through providing excellent quality of education. To make sure that it could contribute to raising the number of educated Filipinos as well as the number professionals who are adept at their chosen fields of specialization, the University offers low tuition fee rates so that even those who come from families with low income can enroll and pursue their education.

To accommodate those who have been deprived of the resources that would enable them to support their education, the University offers various kinds of scholarships so that poor and deserving students will still be able to pursue their hopes and dreams.

For the First Semester of AY 2009-2010, the University granted entrance scholarships to forty-three (43) freshmen, of which twenty (20), who graduated valedictorian, were given full scholarships while twenty-three (23), who were salutatorians, were only required to pay half of their tuition fee.

One hundred sixty five (165) enjoyed academic scholarships, 170 availed the sports/cultural scholarships, and 206 were able to enjoy the benefits of the DILG/ Sangguniang Kabataan scholarship.

Aside from the allocations for scholarship coming from the University's budget, the local and national government agencies also provided scholarship grants, which covered a total of 770 benefactors while 558 enjoyed scholarship grants from private agencies.

In comparison to the number of scholars in the First and Second Semester of AY 2009-2010, the figures presented in Table 18 indicate that the number of scholarship grantees increased by 1.68%. With regard to the number of scholars per campus, there was an increase in the Main Campus by 8.27%, and in the Balanga Campus by 13.41%, 19.9% in Orani Campus; however, the Dinalupihan and Abucay Campuses

experienced a decline in the number of scholars by 2.89% and 5.4%, respectively.

The next table reflects the distribution of scholarship grants among the male and female students in the various campuses of the University.

The project aims to lessen the burden of families who are affected by the global economic crisis through providing financial aid to selected graduating students from the state universities and colleges in Region III. Seventeen students from BPSU were fortunately chosen and will benefit from this project through the sponsorship of various government officials and agencies.

The awarding ceremony was held on 29 September 2009 at the CLARO-NUCESO III Office in the City of San Fernando, Pampanga. Together with the beneficiaries during the awarding ceremony were Dr. Teresita R. Castillo, VP for Student Affairs; Mrs. Olivia H. Perdio, Director of Student Services; Mrs. Lorena G. Zapanta and Dr. Susan Talavera, Guidance Counselors of the Main and Dinalupihan campuses respectively.

SAFE Scholarship Grant and Loan

The enthusiasm of Filipinos towards educating themselves never wavers but such goal is impeded or hindered by the lack of resources to support education. The national government also pursues the dream of increasing the literacy rate and the number of professionals through providing quality education.

Through the Commission on Higher Education, the national government executed various initiatives in order to make quality education accessible to every sector in the society; hence, in 2008, CHED launched the SAFE Scholarship Program.

The SAFE Scholarship Program was launched for the purpose of strengthening the priority courses that were identified by CHED. By making the said scholarship available, there was an increase in the number of students in the Agricultural programs offered by the University.

From the slots provided by CHED, the University still had to request for additional funding as several students showed interest to avail the scholarship loan or grant.

Counseling Services

Learning effectively takes place when an individual is confident that there are people in the University who shall provide assistance in times of difficulty. Being an integral part of the education system, counseling is provided in order to properly harness the students' strengths and to give remedy to their weaknesses or deficiencies.

The Guidance and Counseling Office also made it a part of its duty to implement various orientation programs in order to inform students on the support services available in the campus. Annually, the said office also conducts school hopping activities and career orientation programs to disseminate information about the University's curricular programs and services.

Placement Services

One of the integral functions of the Student Services Office is to coordinate with employers and university staff to enhance the employability of the graduating students and alumni of the University. To further cater to the developmental needs of the graduating students, the Placement Services Office continues to provide the following services:

- Career advising

BPSU Jobs Fair 2009

The Jobs Fair 2009 was successfully held on 26 February 2009 at the Sari-Gamit Covered Court at the Main Campus of the University. The affair was participated in by nine (9) international and eighteen (18) local agencies, all of which were invited by the Office of the Vice-President of Student Affairs (OVPSA) through coordinating with the Department of Labor and Employment (DOLE) and the Public Employment Services Office (PESO). The OVPSA reported that 419 applied in international agencies while 788 applied for the vacancies in local agencies. The University hopes that a large percentage of the applicants will be hired by the said agencies. This kind of event is held annually so that the University can assure its graduates of access to gainful employment and other job opportunities.

Medical and Dental Services

BPSU holds itself accountable in ensuring that its students, faculty and employees are all in good physical condition. Conscious of the fact that physical condition significantly affects the students' capacity learn the University has made it a routine to implement health awareness activities and programs annually. In its thrust and with fervent hopes to attain its goal of producing competitive students and professionals in the future, the Bataan Peninsula State University continues to strengthen the medical and dental services through initiating various strategies.

At present, the University collects Php 110.00 per student every semester. From this meager collection, the University strives to provide the students access to medical services such as blood typing, blood pressure monitoring, eye check up, pap smear and medical examination. For dental services, oral prophylaxis, tooth extraction and restoration are the services provided to the BPSU community members. Aside from the services earlier mentioned, the medical services units of the University implemented other measures in order to further safeguard the physical well-being of all faculty, non-teaching staff, and students. Food handlers are required to undergo medical examination and female employees are given pap smear tests and breast examinations. The Medical Services units in the various campuses also conduct lectures and seminars on drug addiction, communicable diseases, A(H1N1), basic first aid training, food sanitation and food poisoning, effects of cigarette smoking and leptospirosis.

A medical staff was assigned during various in-campus and off-campus activities like intramurals, sportsfest, participation to regional competitions, as well as during extra-curricular activities for foreign students who were enrolled under the English Language Proficiency Program.

Health Assessment of Incoming Students and Students Bound for OJT

Ideally all incoming freshmen as well as students who are bound to undertake their on-the-job training in other companies are required to undergo physical assessment to ensure that they are physically fit to undertake the tasks that will be demanded by the curricular program and so as not to jeopardize the health of the other members in the community.

Equipment and Facilities

At present, the medical and dental clinic in the various campuses of the University is manned with experts in order to assure students, faculty and employees that they are given the appropriate treatment for their condition. Furthermore, the University also strived to provide modern medical and dental equipment and facilities to the clinics in its campuses.

Medical Staff Ratio to Student

In hospitals, the ideal ratio of nurse to a patient is 1:4, and the ideal ratio of doctor to patient is 1:600, and for a dentist it should be 1:1,800. However, due to the rising number of health professionals migrating to other countries has made it impossible for the country to comply with the given ratios.

The University has five (5) campus nurses, two (2) dentists, and one (1) doctor who deliver dental and medical services to the students.

During AY 2009-2010, the number of students summed to 14,365 during the First Semester, with the Main Campus having 6,007 students, Balanga with 4,214, Orani with 1,549, followed by Dinalupihan with 1,723, Abucay with 384, and Bagac with 131 students.

Table 21 indicates the ratio of medical and dental staff to students. If compared to the ideal ratio, data in Table 21 denotes that the number of students being attended by the physicians in the Main, Balanga, Orani, and Dinalupihan campuses exceed the ideal ratio.

Although the University has the capacity to

hire additional physicians, the University does not see the need to recruit a new physician as very few students come to seek the help of the medical and dental staff as cited in Table 22 which reflects the number of students who visited the clinic on a daily basis.

Drive Against Influenza A(H1N1)

A comparative study of the number of students and personnel who came to the clinic for medical consultation in CY 2008 and 2009 showed almost 50% increase in CY 2009, and the most significant increase took place during the months of June, July and August. These could be attributed to nationwide campaign of the DOH calling for public's awareness and consciousness to the existence of the Influenza A(H1N1) virus in the Philippines, and the need to take precautionary measures for its prevention and control, especially in the schools and other populated areas. Such that, students and personnel, who would usually ignore slight fever, came to the clinic for examination and consultation with the slightest sign of feverish feeling during the aforementioned months of June, July and August, 2009.

Residual Spraying Against Dengue Carrying Mosquitoes

With the number of cases of Dengue fever rising during the months of June, the medical team conducted residual spraying activities in the five campuses of the University before the First Semester of AY 2009-2010 started.

By applying such measures, lesser number of students as well as faculty and employees became afflicted by diseases carried by mosquitoes.

On-the-Job Training

The University sought to establish more linkages with local and international companies that would willingly accommodate its students for on-the-job training. Fortunately, the University did not need to exert too much effort on looking for new linkages. Having proven its capacity to produce competitive individuals with a high sense of responsibility and professionalism drew big companies to voluntarily offer their support towards further enhancing the capabilities of the students.

Through the initiative of the Office of the Vice President for Student Affairs and the Placement Office, the on-the-job trainings of students who are in their third or fourth year were properly arranged with partner agencies.

Dedicated to its goal of making its presence known to the neighboring countries in the Asia-Pacific Region, the University sought to send some of its students abroad for their OJT. In the College of Arts and Sciences, through the efforts of the HRM Coordinator, fourth year students majoring in BS Hotel and Restaurant Management were sent to various companies to undertake their first and second semesters Practicum. Thirteen (13) HRM students had successfully undergone International Practicum through the Dream Search International Inc. at the Busch Garden, Virginia, USA from March – June, 2009.

Library

The libraries in the various campuses of the University seek to encourage learning by always aspiring to become competent in providing up-to-date information, facilities, and equipment to both students and faculty.

The services provided by the library or learning resource centers in the various campuses have greatly improved over the years. All of these improvements may be attributed to the efforts of the library personnel who sought the installation of modern facilities and the purchase of books and other reference materials despite constraints in the budget.

Students no longer find the need to go to other libraries in order to get the information they need. The modern facilities and equipment available at the learning resource centers have also inspired faculty members to employ new instructional strategies which further increased the interest of the students to be more diligent and active in their studies.

Collections and Facilities

Every year, the library personnel strive to increase the number of available reference materials in the learning resource center in the five (5) campuses of the University. Despite budget constraints, library holdings were increased and improved via direct purchase and donations from non-government organizations, faculty, and student organizations.

Aside from donations, the libraries were also able to provide the needed reference materials through accessing websites that offer free download of e-books and other reference materials.

From http://www.scribd.com, sixty two (62) e-books were downloaded, printed, and were made available for the students. Through relying on such opportunities, the various libraries of the University remained capable in updating and increasing its collections despite inadequate budget allocations for book purchases.

As per results of the OPIF, it was discovered that some of the book collections in the library were already too old to be used as reference materials; hence, they were moved to the archive section of the library. The publication dates of the archived books range from 1914 to 1960, and such amounted to 207 titles or 440 volumes (see Appendices for the list of books in the archive).

University Library Newsletter

In its desire to provide library users on the latest developments, issues and concerns in the University Library as well as the learning resource centers in the satellite campuses of the University, the newsletter "Discover" was launched.

Library Linkages

Each year, the book collections and other library materials continue to increase due to the support extended by various individuals and outside organizations.

As of 2009, the University has identified thirty (30) linkages that have donated books and other collections to the libraries. Since the number of students in each campus continues to increase every year, the University hopes that it will be able to establish more ties with organizations and individuals so that more developments can be made in its libraries and to provide better services to the students.

Abucay Campus Receives Book Donations from Neem Tree and Butterfly Sanctuary Project

Twenty (20) boxes of books on various fields of learning were turned over for donation to the BPSU Abucay campus library on 18 June 2009.

The donation of the books was made through Mr. Edwin Corl and Ms. Ludivina Liebig of The Neem Tree and Butterfly Project.

Dr. Magpantay and the other University officials appreciated the kindness of Mr. Corl and Mrs.Liebig for choosing to donate the books to BPSU. The University pursues the increase of its book collections in its campus libraries to accommodate the demands of the students; however, the available budget is not adequate for the purchase of the needed number of books.

Other than the book donations, Mr. Corl and Mrs. Liebig also granted scholarships to the three students majoring in Agriculture.

Furthermore, they also proposed to establish a butterfly garden and a breadfruit nursery in BPSU Abucay.

Furthermore, it is essential to take into consideration the ratio between the librarians and students in the campuses as such will help to determine whether the University was able to meet the standards of CHED.

Table 33 provides the data on the ratio of professional librarians to students. As of 2009, the University is still striving to provide the needed number of librarians in each campus in order to meet the requirements of CHED.

As shown in the Table 33, the number of librarians is outnumbered by the number of students visiting the library on a daily basis. The only campus which was able to meet the ideal ratio was the Abucay Campus.

research

ear 2009 contained not only brighter promises for Bataan Peninsula State University but also tougher challenges. Despite the limitations brought about by the problematic economy of the country, BPSU remained unfazed and fearlessly explored unknown paths with great hopes of arriving successfully to its target destination. The University takes great pride by having been blessed with community members who are adequately equipped with the right attitude and skills. The pressing situations in the country may have aroused an iota of fear amongst the Peninsulares but this was overcome by their great desire to show their capacity to thrive even in the most desperate times.

Out of the problems faced in Year 2009, came the several research outputs that benefitted not only the University but also the surrounding communities. Through conducting researches that are in tune with the present situation of the community, the University was able to provide immediate solutions and such successful researches also drew the attention of various linkages that willingly provided support to the endeavors of BPSU.

The relevance of such researches paved the way for national and international organizations to give recognition and opportunities for these researches to be presented and also to receive financial and technical supports from external organizations.

Researches Conducted

Over the years, the Research and Development Office continues to motivate faculty members to conduct researches which would be of great value to the University and to its surrounding communities. Every year, BPSU strives to produce more researches that are relevant to the current needs of the community; hence, it continues to encourage members of the faculty and also the students to conduct studies and produce innovative materials that may be used as income generating projects or as part of the extension services of the University.

Funds were made available in order to serve as support to the researchers and also to ensure the sustainability of the research projects. The University also sought to forge new partnerships with other SUCs and external organizations with which it can conduct collaborative researches and can also obtain additional funding.

For CY 2009, the following research projects flourished and some were also completed with the aid of the University and its partners:





Figure 4. Distribution of Completed and On-Going Researches According to Discipline Figure 5. Profile of Faculty According to Highest Educational Attainment as of 2009



In terms of researches that are currently undertaken by the University, the agriculture section greatly surpasses the number of research studies conducted in other disciplines. For the on-going research projects, Health and Health-Related researches remain at the bottom; hence, the University needs to exert effort and to encourage its researchers to generate more researches in the said area.

Figure 5 summarizes the total number of the completed and on-going research projects in the areas of agriculture, engineering and technology, health and health-related concerns, and social and behavioral sciences. As exhibited in the chart, the University was able to generate the largest number of researches in agriculture, thereby surpassing the number of researches in

the other disciplines with the number of researches in Health lagging behind.

The large number of agricultural researches may be attributed to the fact that in Year 2009, the country experienced problems on food security; hence, researchers focused on how they can respond to such concerns by conducting studies on how the community can attain food security through the application of new techniques and strategies and through the conservation of the natural resources.

Fewer Health and Health-Related researches may have been generated in Year 2009 since majority of the faculty in this area have heavier workloads compared to the rest of the members of the BPSU community.

Researches for implementation

Aside from the completed and on-going researches presented earlier, it is also noteworthy to mention that there are other researches submitted to the Research and Development Office for review and approval.

In BPSU, faculty researchers are required to consult with the Research and Development Office and other experts in the various areas of research so that they will be properly guided on how to properly and successfully attain the objectives of their study, without going beyond the ethics of research.

For Year 2009, the following research proposals shown in Table 38 have been reviewed and were approved for implementation.To ensure that the research studies will be properly sustained during the conduct of the study until its implementation, the University allocated budgets for these researches. To further sustain the other researches, the University sought to forge partnerships with other SUCs and other external organizations for additional technical and funding assistance.




Figure 7. Internally-funded Completed, On-going, and Approved for Implementation Researches

Figures 6 and 7 show the status of researches that have been given internal and external funding. As shown in the figures, the number of externally-funded researches surpassed the number of completed and on-going researches that are internallyfunded. Such information may imply that

externally-funded researches have more possibility of being immediately completed since outside organizations have the capacity to provide bigger funds.

Figure 6 indicates that the University has completed forty percent (40%) while the other forty percent (40%) of its internallyfunded researches are still being conducted, and twenty percent (20%) of the University's budget for researches have been allocated to the research proposals that were approved in 2009. As justification to the number of internallyfunded completed and on-going researches versus the number of researches with external funding, the delay for the completion of internally-funded researches may be attributed to budget constraints as well as the availability of materials needed for the project.

Papers Presented to Conferences

In terms of researches, the Bataan Peninsula State University has already gained recognition from other agencies, be it in the local or international arena. Being invited to present papers in national and international conferences is one indication that BPSU marks up to the standards set by other agencies. This also reflects the capability of faculty members to produce researches that can create a huge impact on the development of the society.


Regional

Based on Table 39, researchers of the University had participated actively and presented their papers to regional conferences. Through their participation in such activities, faculty researchers were given the chance to determine whether their researches can comply with the regional standards. As per results of the attended conferences in the regional category, only one out of the four papers presented emerged as winner. The paper entitled "Development and Evaluation of an Improved Biomass Cookstove for Household Use" of the faculty researchers in the Abucay Campus was declared 2nd Best Paper in the Technology Generated Category during the CLIERDEC 9th Regional Symposium.

Figure 6. Externally-funded Completed, On-going, and Approved for Implementation Researches

National

Faculty researchers strived to have their papers submitted for evaluation to external organizations within the country in order for them to participate in national research conferences that would probably pave the way for further recognition of the products of their labor.

Several researchers have benefitted from courageously presenting their papers to such activities as other SUCs and national organizations have expressed their willingness to extend technical or financial support for the study.

Six research studies were presented to national conferences this year and one of the presented researches ended up as finalist. The said paper is entitled An Ethnographic Study of the Literary Arts among the Ayta of Bataan authored by Mr. Neil D. David of the BPSU Abucay Campus. Although BPSU was not able to secure any award in the national research conferences for Year 2009, the Ayta Magbukon School of Living Traditions, also by Mr. Neil D. David, obtained funding from the National Commission on Culture and Arts. The funds have been released to the University and were used for the conduct of the activity wherein fifteen (15) Ayta Magbukon students aged 12-19 years old were given orientations on traditional musical instrument playing and traditional Ayta Magbukon cooking, chanting, singing and dancing.

International

To venture into a new horizon and to make its presence known and felt in the neighboring countries in the Asia-Pacific region remain among the greatest targets of the University.

Peninsulares believe that this can be achieved through participating in international events; hence, several researchers sought forth the presentation of their research projects to conferences. Although for 2009, the presented researches were not able to obtain awards from the aforementioned international research conferences, the presentation of the said researches paved the way for Bataan Peninsula State University to gain recognition.

Likewise, it is also through such events that the University gets the opportunity to forge international linkages and acquire new ideas and techniques that will further fast track and even enhance the quality of the researches being conducted.

In-House Reviews

The University continues to conduct inhouse reviews regularly as such kind of activity provides the University's research experts to discover faculty research projects that have potential to change the way of living.

In 2009, twenty-one researches were presented in in-house reviews held at the various campuses of the University. Inhouse reviews provide research experts to select papers which possess attributes that may qualify for presentation in regional or international research conferences. The said event also helps researchers to acquire new insights on how they can further improve their researches through the comments and suggestions made by the panelists and participants.

Recognized Researches

BPSU has generated numerous awardwinning researches in the various disciplines. With regard to the performance in terms of research presentations in the different competition levels, majority of the awards gained were only in the local and regional level. Although, no international awards were secured in Year 2009, Peninsulares do not lose heart that it will conquer the international arena in the near future.

Out of the fifteen (15) researchers presented in local and regional research conferences, only four (4) researches were able to secure awards in regional competitions while eleven (11) garnered places in local research presentations.

Among these recognized researches, the development of Fish Drying Facilities, the study on the Performance of Different Aerobic Rice Varieties under the Upland Ecosystem, and the Promotion of Protective Cultivation of Technology for Value Organic Vegetable Production gained popularity due to the potential of the said researches to respond to the current and future concern of the community.

Published Researches

The BPSU Research and Development Office continually targets the effective dissemination of the researches generated by the University's faculty and employees. It is through initiating such strategy that the University promotes the researches generated by its faculty and employees.

Furthermore, publishing aided the University to earn support from external organizations that provided funding and helped the University ensure the completion as well as the sustainability of the project.

To attain this objective, the RDO sought to publish completed and on-going projects in monographs and in the BPSU Research Journal while other activities of the office were published in the Infobits.

Patented Researches

For AY 2009-2010, the Research and Development Office pursued the patenting of Engr. Jonathan E. Lacayanga's research project "Manual Rice Hill Seeder" last February 12, 2009 as well as the acquisition of the International Standard Book Number (ISBN) from the National Library in Manila for the monographs.

Such moves were initiated for the assurance that the researchers' and the inventions' rights and ownership will be protected.

Special Projects of the RDO

Research Project on the Development of Silaqui Island

On November 25, 2009, University President Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay signed a memorandum of agreement with Mayor Alfonso Celeste of Bolinao, Pangasinan. Through the said agreement, the BPSU team composed of Engr. Rodrigo C. Muñoz, Jr., Mr. Reynan P. Calderon, Mr. Rudy C. Flores, Dr. Hermogenes M. Paguia, Mr. Celso De Guzman was tapped for the development of water and electrical systems in Bolinao, Pangasinan. The implementation of the project is deemed to enhance the way of living of the inhabitants of Silaqui and also to encourage foreign and local tourists to visit the said place.

The team went back to Silaqui on December 5-8, 2009 to gather data regarding the potability and availability of water. The team also sought to determine the geological soundness of the island hence they invited Ms. Catherine Abon, a licensed geologist from UP Diliman, to join them during the visit. Aside from the aforementioned tasks, the mapping of the Silaqui island was also conducted through utilizing the Global Positioning System (GPS).

On December 20-21, 2001 the testing of communication was done through the twoway radio. The test was conducted in order to determine the efficiency and effectiveness of the delivery of basic social services from the mainland to the island of Silaqui. In this visit, the team was with Mr. Eduardo S. Tinao of BPSU and Engr. Adrian Singian of the Don Honorio Ventura Technological State University.

Coffee Rehabilitation Project

Last June 11, 2009, the VPREAS Office in collaboration with the Philippine Coffee Board, Inc. jointly entered into memorandum of agreement for the Rehabilitation of Coffee Production Program in Bataan. The Bangkal Bataan Upland Farmers Association, Inc. (BBUFAI) as one of the progressive people's organization in the province was identified as implementing arm in the program. The BBUFAI in coordination with the Extension Services of Abucay Campus shall implement and monitor the project activities as well as the collection of payment by cooperators after two year production period.

On the other hand, the overall coffee industry situation was discussed by Dr. Alejandro Mojica, Director of NCRDEC while overview of the program on "Pilipinas, Gumising at Magkape" was delivered by Ms. Pacita U. Juan.

MOA Signing took place after the program which has been signed by Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay, for For. Romualdo de Guzman of BBUFAI and Dr. Alejandro Mojica of PCBI was attested by the participants from LGU of Dona Remedios Trinidad, DTI representative in Bataan LGUs in Bataan and farmers from Samal and Abucay.

Dr. Alejandro Mojica, the national coffee expert served as lecturer during the 2 hours lecture on Modern Coffee Production Technology and Rehabilitation Practices. 30 farmers from Bulacan, Pampanga including guest from LGU and DTI have attended and finished the training.

Faculty and Employee Involvement in Research

As stipulated in the legal documents of BPSU such as the University Code and its Research Manual, faculty members, especially those with the rank of Assistant Professor, shall be required to conduct researches. In review of the documents submitted by the Research and Development Office, it was revealed that for Year 2009, Table 47 indicates the list of faculty and personnel were able to submit research proposals and to conduct research studies.

Aside from the number of researches conducted, c presented, and awarded, the University also pays close attention to the number of faculty who diligently ventures into conducting researches aside from attending to their regular duties and responsibilities.

Every year, the University hopes to have an increase in the number of faculty-generated researches. Moreover, the University never ceases to persuade its teaching personnel to venture into researches that will help change the current situation of the University and the outside community.

Table 46 exhibits the number of faculty researchers according to gender and tenure of office. In terms of gender, it is noticeable that majority of those who have conducted researches in Year 2009 are females.

With regard to the tenure of office and gender, Table 46 indicates that majority of those who conducted researches in the past year have permanent employment status and majority of these permanent employees are males.



Figure 8 indicates the total population of faculty researchers according to tenure of office. As shown in the chart, most of the researches generated in 2009 were products of the efforts of faculty with permanent status while thirty-one percent (31%) of the total number of faculty researchers are contractual.

In consideration of the total population of faculty, BPSU has 500 faculty members. From this total number, only twenty-nine (29) permanent and thirteen (13) contractual faculty members were able to submit research proposals and conduct researches in 2009.

Table 14 exhibits the total number of faculty according to rank and salary grade. The data in this table shall be used as comparison to the total number of faculty who conducted researches in 2009, which is reflected in Table 47.

Such data were reviewed to determine whether the University was able to comply with the provision in its Code that Assistant and Associate Professors must be required to conduct researches. Also, the said data may help the University, specifically the RDO, to identify new strategies and techniques that will, motivate more faculty members to engage in research activities. Figure 8. o be great is not only to earn glory for oneself. The true essence of greatness lies in the capacity of an individual or an organization to extend its potentials for the further empowerment of those inside and outside their circle.

As the pioneer state university in the province of Bataan, this University always makes it a point to fulfill its responsibility to contribute to the development of its surrounding communities. Hence, in Year 2009, through the leadership of the Director of the Office of Extension Services, Dr. Elizabeth A. Joson, the University launched several projects that made impact and changed the lives of several individuals.

It is also noteworthy to mention that these projects would not meet its objectives without the strong commitment of the University's extentionists. Moreover, these projects would not have made a large impact on the community if not for the support that we get from the University's external linkages.

Extension Activities

The tables in the proceeding pages show the various extension projects conducted by the University in the towns of Bataan. Also reflected in the tables are the number of beneficiaries, the nature, and the status of the project. In terms of the data pertaining to the profile of the project beneficiaries, sex-disaggregated data were provided as such help the University to determine the gender-responsiveness of the projects conducted.

Applying the said technique also helps the Office of Extension Service to maintain a balance in the number of programs provided for the male and female members in the community.

Special Projects

Special extension projects were also launched in 2009 as the University aims to further disseminate information on the various events in the University as well as the points-of-view of the members of the BPSU community on the current concerns of the Filipinos.

Establishment of the BPSU Community Radio

The Bataan Community Radio was established on 28 April 2009 located at the 2nd floor of the College of Engineering and Architecture Building at the BPSU Main Campus. The project was the brainchild



of University President Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay. The University Radio is known among the Peninsulares and Bataeños as Radyo Vatan or DZWB 87.50 FM.

As preparation for its launching, Dr. Magpantay assigned the members of the Technical Working Group who shall be incharge of maintaining the operations of the community radio. The TWG is spearheaded by Dr. Gregorio J. Rodis, VP for Research, Extension and Auxiliary Services; Engr. Rodrigo C. Muñoz, Jr., Licensed ECE; Miss Arlene I. Pascual, the community radio's station manager; Dir. Magdalena A. Abella of the Office of Administrative Services, and selected faculty and employees.

At present, Radyo Vatan airs various programs from five o'clock in the morning until seven o'clock in the evening. One of the programs, Sa Kabukilan, was given funding by the National Commission on Culture and Arts amounting to Php 200,000.00.

Training Center, BPSU Abucay Campus. To raise the awareness of the participants on the involvement of other agencies in the conduct of the University's various extension projects, the University invited representatives from the Commission on Higher Education (CHED), Philippine Association of Extension Program Implementers, Inc. (PAEPI), Provincial Social Welfare and Development Office (Bataan) and other higher education institutions.

During the culmination of the activity, the University Extension Agenda was presented as well as the University policies, directions and priorities with regard to extending its programs and services to the community.

The faculty members and other members of the BPSU community were also encouraged to get involved in the University's extension projects. It was also explained in the forum that extension programs being conducted by a state university affects the budget that is allocated for the university.

Other concerns elucidated during the event are the economic conditions of the Bataeños from poverty level, addiction, out—ofschool youth, and economic condition, as the aforementioned factors are very significant in the conduct of extension and social services.

Extension and Outreach Project to Bani Elementary School

On 27 June 2009, a group of students from Sunmoon University in South Korea and Sunmoon University manager Prof. Choi Kwang Suk and Coordinator Anthony Lee, arrived at the Bataan Peninsula State University to extend their assistance in conducting the extension and outreach project in Bani Elementary School in Brgy. Cataning, City of Balanga, Bataan.

Before the activity was initiated, the University through the help of the Department of Education - City of Balanga gathered data to determine the status of Bani Elementary School. The gathered data indicated that the Bani Elementary School, aside from being located in an upland area and far from the town proper, had several problems that can hinder the proper development of students such as minimal electrical line for illumination use in the classrooms and absence of water system. Students were also undernourished and their families are incapable of providing their basic needs. Hence, on 27 June 2010 Sunmoon University donated clothes, school supplies, medicines and vitamins, and electrical wire.

Oplan Tulong for Typhoon Ondoy Victims

The University launched Oplan Tulong sa mga Biktima ni Ondoy on 09 September 2009 to reach out and uplift the downtrodden spirits of the residents of Manila and other parts of Luzon who were greatly affected by the typhoon.

Monetary and other forms of contributions and donations were forwarded by students, faculty and employees to the NSTP offices in the various campuses of the University. Donations like food and other goods were coursed through the ABS-CBN Foundation and GMA Kapuso Foundation for distribution to affected areas.

Grants Obtained by Extension Activities

NCCA Grants Funding Assistance to Radyo Vatan Program: Sa Kabukilan

Radyo Vatan's Program Sa Kabukilan, proposed by Mr. Neil D. David, with its noble intention of preserving the cultural arts of the Magbukon Aeta community receives funding assistance in the amount of Php 200,000.00 from the National Commission for Culture and the Arts (NCCA).

Mr. Neil David designed Sa Kabukilan in response to the on-going acculturation of the Ayta of Bataan.

The radio program presently broadcasts the Ayta culture and way of life through playing of indigenous music; live interviews with tribal leaders and experts; discussion of current issues and events; and narration of oral histories, cultural traditions, mores and beliefs.

The different programs of the National Commission on Indigenous Peoples (NCIP) shall also be included in the program.

The BPSU General Appropriations Act Budget for calendar year 2009 amounted to Php154,282,000, in which budget allotted to Personal Services is Php113,165,000 (70%), Php26,093,000 (20%) of the budget was allotted to Maintenance and Other Operating Expenses (MOOE), and Capital Outlay received a budget of 15,024,000.00 (10%) from the total.

The ten million pesos (Php10,000,000) of the Capital Outlay budget came from the Congressional Initiative while the remaining Php5,024,000 was funded by the Department of Budget and Management (DBM).

In addition to GAA for 2009, the following were also received by BPSU through the DBM-MPBF (Miscellaneous Personnel Benefits Fund):

Table 50 reflects the University's expenses and generated income.

Expenses incurred and income generated for CY 2008 and 2009 are presented in order to reflect how much the University spent and earned.

Through providing data from CY 2008 and 2009, the University will be able to identify the improvements that it has to make in order to maximize its resources.

Income Generating Projects

Aside from the budget allocations provided by the National Government, the University utilized its vast resources in its five campuses in order to come up with income generating projects that will further sustain its operations.

he University recognizes its vital role as a public institution in taking part in the national government's advocacies to maximize its capabilities and deliver a more efficient and effective services to the public. In compliance to the national government's call for austerity measures, the University did its best to manage its resources wisely while remaining responsive, responsible, and accountable to the members of the BPSU community.

Continually fueled by its intense desire to properly execute the programs that are vital in contributing to national development, cuts in the budget seemed less threatening as the University's fiscal management team were able to maximize the University's meager resources through appropriate budget allocations. The consolidated income generated of all IGPs operated by the university amounted to Php4,420,598.25, as per records gathered from the Accounting Department.

Income generated in the different campuses usually come from dormitories, canteens, and IGPs such as those involving crop production, animal production, business centers, short term courses, internet and computer services and others.

Main Campus Income Generating Projects

The Main Campus' prominent IGPs include Garments Production, Marketing Center, Cybernook (internet and computer service), Foundry, and PATVEP Hostel/Canteen. The Garments Production Department which produces all uniform worn by the students of BPSU, the Foundry Department which now has recently catered its services in manufacturing benches for the City Government of Balanga and the PATVEP Hostel/Canteen which houses University guests generated the bulk of the income of the Main Campus IGPs. The Marketing Center, where various products and pasalubongs could be bought also produced income for the university. Although minimal, the income generated by the Cybernook could not be simply overlooked since it was temporarily shutdown during the summer months due to lack of clienteles, mostly students. Total net income generated by these IGPs amounted to Php2,310,489.30.

Balanga Campus Income Generating Projects

For the Balanga Campus (BC), the university bus which is daily used by the BSN students

for their daily duties in hospitals in Bataan and Pampanga generated the most income of all BC IGPs. Total gross income generated by the BC IGPs amounted to Php1,625,800.00.

Abucay Campus Income Generating Projects

Most of the IGPs in Abucay are agriculturerelated such as Layer Production Project, Swine Production and Fattening Project, Ruminant Project, Goat Raising Project, Broiler Production Project, Crop Production, Nursery and Greenhouse Project and tractor rental. Dormitories and the school canteen are also sources of income. Two technology commercialization projects were established, one regarding organic vegetable production and the other one is about a semi-commercial scale goat raising farm with the funding aid by the Bureau of Agricultural Research, and hopefully these two projects will greatly contribute to the income generated by the Abucay Campus in the years to come.

For the mean time, the Orchard Field Crops added an amount of Php78,448.50 to the university's income for the year. For the Broiler and Laver Projects, total net income for the year are Php797,739.50 and Php1,313,349.63, respectively. The same could not be said on the swine project. Based on the report of total collections and expenses, the project incurred losses due to feed expenses. Although it generated a gross income of Php701,484.00, expenses totaled to Php1,883,550.25. However, note that these figures does not include amount of all inventoried stocks and products. Stocks for the Ruminant Project include, goats, sheep and buffaloes. Total estimated amount of these stocks is Php270,000.00. For the Swine Project, the amount of inventory is Php486,124.00.For the nursery

and greenhouse projects, total amount of inventories is pegged at Php212885.00. For the Orchard/Crop Production Project, total amount of all inventoried plants and trees amounted to Php922,255.00.

Orani Campus Income Generating Projects

The IGP of the Orani Campus is very promising with the commercial operation of the newly-acquired 10-hectare fishpond intended for the fisheries course and fish processing center of the University. With its fist hauling income during the last two days of December 2009 and the income generated from the canteen space rentals, photocopying center, sports facilities, shortterm training courses and internet/computer services, Orani Campus generated PhP 372,278.81. With the plan of transferring the Garments in Orani Campus, to make use of the space in the Main Campus for instructional purposes, IGP in Orani Campus will increase. At present, the former Administration building of the Orani Campus will be converted into a Garments factory for operation in 2011.

Dinalupihan Campus Income Generating Projects

The main contributor in terms of income generated among IGPs in Dinalupihan Campus is the Business Center. Rental of the business center together with the rentals on the canteen, chairs and covered court amounted to Php669,816.60. Other sources of income are water and electricity bill collection and the internet café. The total income generated for DC is Php702,479.89.

physical plant

D elivering quality education and services to the members of the BPSU community does not only rest in giving quality instruction to students and provision of adequate incentives to faculty and employees. This realization is greatly considered by Bataan Peninsula State University as it aspires to reach the level of other recognized universities in the Philippines and in the Asia-Pacific region. As such, developments in its physical plants, facilities, and laboratories were pursued in 2009. Through the developments made, the University is now assured of its capacity to provide a clean, secure and comfortable environment for teaching and learning.

Land Area of BPSU

The University possesses a total land area of 85.67 hectares from which 57% is used for the operations of the University and the remaining 43% are composed of upland areas. These upland areas are being developed and used for the income generating projects of the University.

Infrastructure Projects

For the year 2009, a total of Php 34,146,009.40 was used for the various infrastructure projects of the different campuses of BPSU, which range from renovation, completion, extension, and initial construction of buildings.

The following the developments were proposed and implemented in the University's six campuses:

Main Campus

Refurbishment of the Old Engineering Building

Due to the expanding number of curricular programs and number of enrollees in the College of Arts and Sciences, the University sought the refurbishment of the old Engineering Building and to convert the said building as extension of the College of Arts and Sciences.

The refurbishment started on the month of March 2009 and was finished on May 2009,




Figure 10. Combined Land Area of BPSU According to Usage

just in time for the opening of classes for the First Semester of AY 2009-2010. The old building was repainted and to minimize the noise coming from the outside, to promote better ventilation and to protect the students during the rainy season. The refurbishment of the building amounted to Php 750,850.00.

Moreover, the ESF Building, which houses the College of Arts and Science also underwent renovation for the purpose of improving the ventilation in the five (5) rooms used for Science classes. The project cost Php 167,800.00.



Renovation of the ME & ECE Laboratory

Room 306 and 307 of the College of Engineering and Architecture was renovated to serve as accreditation room of the College. The renovation cost amounted to Php 220,000.00.

A few months after, the repainting and improvement of the CEA building was pursued. The project was completed after two months and the expenses amounted to Php 866,030.00.

The RAC Technical Shop also underwent renovation and is presently being used for the safekeeping of the ME/CE laboratory equipment. The next project pursued by the CEA is the refurbishment of the Practical Arts Building which now functions as the laboratory room of Architecture students.





Extension of the PATVEP Welding and Fabrication Technology Shop Room

Over the years, the popularity of technicalvocational courses continues to level up thus resulting to the increase in the number of students in the said course. In order to address the need of the students to the PATVEP Welding and Fabrication Technology Shop Room was expanded to meet the requirements for shop rooms as prescribed by CHED and to accommodate larger number of students. The project was given funds amounting to Php 1,545,000.00 and was completed on May 2009.

Relocation of the R&D Office and the University Display Center

To make communication and delivery of services for efficient and effective for the other offices inside and outside the University, the Research, Extension and Auxiliary units in the Main Campus have started to transfer to the Old Tanghal Likha Building. Such meant the relocation of the business and display center of the University to the old Research and Development Office. Before the relocation, renovations were made.

On the month of May, the renovation on the former R&D Office started and as targeted the business and display center of the University was able to relocate in the former R&D Office in July 2009.

Office for the Vice President for Academic Affairs Moves to New Location

In order to prepare for the construction of the University's Interfaith Chapel, the Office of the Vice President for Academic Affairs has moved to a new location within the Main Campus.

It now occupies the office which used to be the faculty room and office of the now phased-out Laboratory School.





Replacement of the worn-out GI roofing and metal purlins of the PATVEP Canteen

The PATVEP Hostel Canteen serves as one of the fastest earning IGPs of the University. In order to serve well its customers not only with delicious and nutritious meals but also with a safe venue where they can eat and relax during their free periods, its GI roofings and metal purlins were replaced. The said replacement required only few days to be completed and the project cost Php 44,776.00.

Balanga Campus

Completion of the "Palawan" Building

With the perennial problem of flooding around the building during the rainy season, which explains the nickname "Palawan" Building as the area looks like an island isolated by water, the University addressed the said hassle via repairs and additional construction for the famous building in BPSU Balanga.

Installation of Water System at the CNM Laboratory

In order to continually ensure the safety of the students, as well as satisfy the requirements of the program, a water system was installed and completed at the College of Nursing and Midwifery laboratory located at the Balanga Campus.

Repair and Repainting of the Education Building

BPSU continues to enhance the quality of the learning facilities of the students. The once worn-looking and seemingly dilapidated classrooms of the Education Building were given a make-over, thereby making the said rooms more conducive for the teachinglearning process.





Orani Campus


Completion of Phase II of the HRM Laboratory and Lecture Building in Orani Campus


As the home campus of the BS Hotel and Restaurant Management program, the Orani Campus now boasts of a better HRM laboratory and lecture building. The said building shall simulate work conditions; thus, giving students a more realistic exposure and training on the discipline.

Establishment of a Center for Marine Studies

With the conversion of BPSU more than two years ago, the University has been feverish and continually passionate in ensuring that Bataeños' welfare and development are given utmost importance. Thus, the University President, during a meeting with Bataan District II House Representative Hon. Albert Raymond S. Garcia, Orion Municipal Mayor Hon. Antonio L. Raymundo, and the Bataan School of Fisheries (BSF) Administrator Mr. Gerardo C. Batalla, discussed matters regarding academic tie-ups for the benefit of the community—including the proposal of establishing a Center for Marine Studies in BSF through utilization of the two hectares available in the said school.

The Center will focus on research studies and investigation related to fisheries which will be very useful to the fishermen of Orion and of other municipalities in which fishing is the main income source. Such was deemed as timely and feasible as there is a current demand for academic, research, extension and production activities in Fisheries, such project is indeed highly feasible.





An endorsement from the Regional Director of the Department of Education has been forwarded to BPSU, and the Memorandum of Agreement was drafted.

BPSU is confident that such facility will greatly benefit the community in more ways than one, and shall contribute to the betterment of the quality of human life of the people from Bataan, as well as those from neighboring provinces.

Dinalupihan Campus

Completion of BPSU Dinalupihan's Four-Storey Academic Building

The Office of Bataan District I Rep. Herminia B. Roman allocated Php10 million for the completion of the four-storey academic building at the BPSU Dinalupihan Campus. The required Work and Financial Plan has already been submitted on 09 June 2009 for evaluation of the Department of Budget and Management Regional Office.

Perimeter Fence of Dinalupihan Campus Courtesy of the PTA

Through the combined efforts of the members of the Parents and Teachers Association, and the local officials of BPSU Dinalupihan, students as well as campus property are now more secured with the completion of the perimeter fence.

Abucay Campus

Completion of the Farmers Training Center in Abucay Campus

In keeping with the aim of establishing the Abucay Campus as the Research, Extension and Training center of the University, BPSU prioritized the completion of the Farmers Training Center in the said campus. With the number of research and extension projects being undertaken in collaboration with other government agencies and representative





from the communities, the Farmers Training Center shall indeed prove to be a practical venue to hold trainings, workshop and meetings. It shall also serve as a source of income for the University.

Completion of the Banana Tissue Culture Laboratory in Abucay Campus

Funded by the DA-BAR, which released the amount of Php522,860, the Banana Tissue Culture Laboratory was completed is now being used to utilize upland farming areas and to boost the production of bananas, especially the Lakatan, Latundan, Saba and Quarenta Dias varieties in the province. It is hoped that the presence of the tissue culture laboratory will free farmers from the hassle of traveling to other places in order to acquire the planting materials that they need and will also help agriculturists in determining new methods on how to improve the banana production in the province. Other agencies like NEDA and DOST have also supported the establishment of the tissue culture laboratory in BPSU Abucay Campus. Apart from the benefits mentioned, the laboratory has also been very helpful in developing the research capabilities of the students, and is also being utilized for the extension services of the University.

Bagac Campus

Construction of the Bagac Campus Building

The Department of Budget and Management released on 29 May 2009 through the Department of Public Works and Highways Bataan II District Engineering. Office the amount of Php5 million for the construction of the BPSU Bagac Campus school building.

Rodis, the concurrent Vice President for Research, Extension and Auxiliary Services. In spite of the said transition, everyone coped up effortlessly and has extended all necessary efforts for the management of OVPAF to run smoothly and seamlessly.

In case of written reques

The Office of the Vice President has still three major divisions in its fold: Administrative Services, Finance and Management Services, and Physical Plant and Engineering Services. Presented below are the different initiatives undertaken by the three divisions respectively.

Administrative Services

With a wide array of functions that it performs within the University, the Office of Administrative Services is subdivided into five (5) units: the Human Resource Department, the Medical and Dental Services, Security Services, the Property and Procurement Services, and the General Services. Each unit persevered to meet the targets indicated in the Medium Term Development Plan of the University for 2008-2012.

Human Resource

From recruiting and hiring the best and the brightest applicants, the Human Resource Department (HRD) continues to find ways on how it can supply the University with a workforce who possess strong commitment in upholding the glory of the University. This office works like a sieve for it filters everyone who wishes to become part of the University's workforce. The department also implements various programs that will further strengthen the drive of the teaching and non-teaching personnel to render quality services.

Tenure

At present, the University has 796 employees, of which 507 are members of the faculty while 289 are part of the nonteaching workforce. The figures and tables below show the profile of the University's non-teaching personnel.

From the data presented, it can be seen that the number of permanent employees exceed the number of temporary, contractual, casual and job-order employees in the University. The table also shows that the University had the highest number of permanent employees in 2007 and a slight decrease in the number in 2008. This number was maintained until 2009

With regard to the number of contractual employees, there was a big increase in Year 2009 as the previous population of 19 contractual non-teaching employees increased to 72 as the University hired an additional number of 53 employees.

A decrease on the number of casual employees was also experienced in 2009 while the number of job order employees continued to decline in the past year. It is also in 2009, that two (2) employees of the University were put on a temporary status. The data presented in the chart may be explained in the following ways:



- The number of permanent employees may have decreased from122 to 118 due to retirement of some employees.
- The increase in the number of contractual employees may be attributed to the increasing need of the University for people who would man the different offices across its five satellite campuses and one extension campus. Such increase may also be linked to the change of tenure of some employees from job order or casual status to contractual status.
- As stated in number 3, the number of casual employees may have declined due to change in tenure or resignation of some employees from their positions to pursue jobs in other organizations or abroad.
- The decrease in the number of job order employees may be brought about by the decision of the University to grant a casual status to those who have performed well in the past year or separation from service.
- Two personnel were put on a temporary . status as preparation to their change of tenure once they have complied to the requirements set by the Civil Service Commission.
- The chart also displays that in year 2009, no non-teaching employee was promoted to a permanent status. Such may be brought about by lack of vacant positions or lack of qualified employees for the vacant position; hence, there was no change in the number of permanent employees in Year 2008 and 2009.

Figure 11 shows the distribution of nonteaching personnel across the campuses of the University. As exhibited in Figure 11, the number of non-teaching personnel in

the Main Campus exceeds the number of non-teaching personnel in other campuses.

Gender

The University always seeks to provide equal opportunities to both male and female in terms of recruitment; hence during the process of recruitment, the HRD takes into great account certain provisions on Human Rights and Gender and Development. Aside from seeking to promote human rights and gender equality during the recruitment and selection process, the HRD sought to be more gender-responsive in terms of assigning duties and responsibilities to all the members of the University's workforce.

Table 57 shows the distribution of male and female non-teaching employees in the various campuses of the University. From the total number of non-teaching employees, Table 35 shows that the number of male employees still exceeds the number of female employees; however, this does not mean that the University favored males during the recruitment and selection process since the HRD actually focuses more on the qualifications of the applicant, interpersonal skills, and on the outcome of interviews.

Educational Attainment

As mentioned earlier, the educational attainment of applicants usually becomes

the basis for HRD in terms of hiring employees. It can be observed from the figure below that in 2009, majority of the non-teaching employees are holders of baccalaureate degree. It is also observable in Table 58 that the number of non-teaching employees who are elementary or high school graduates continued to decrease in 2009 while the number of employees who attained vocational education increased. On the other hand, those with master's degree, compared to the figure in 2007 decreased in number similar to the number of employees with doctoral degrees.

Activities Conducted by the HRD

The University, through its Human Resources Department, continues to encourage its workforce to find or to grab opportunities that will help them secure better and higher positions in the future.

Even if in 2009 the number of non-teaching employees with master's and doctoral degrees declined due to resignation or retirement the University believes that the number of employees with MA/MS and

PhD will be immediately replenished as several of the non-teaching employees are actively pursuing advanced studies.

Although some of the administrative positions available in the University only have minimum requirements, the Human Resources Department also continues to pursue their development through conducting trainings and seminars.

Adoption of the Citizen's Charter

On September 2009 the University sought the full implementation of the Citizen's Charter, an official document, a service standard, a pledge that communicates information on the services provided by the University to its clientele. The adoption of the Citizen's Charter was prompted by the Civil Service Commission's call to government agencies to comply with the Implementing Rules and Regulations of Republic Act 9485 or the Anti-Red Tape Act of 2007.

Through University Order No. 14, series of 2009, the BPSU Citizen's Charter Team (CCT) was created and started its operation on June 16, 2009 and conducted orientation and workshops among frontline service providers in all campuses of the University.

The ARTA of 2007 requires the dissemination of the Citizen's Charter in various media and the conduct of anti-fixers 'campaign. Billboards containing detailed and stepby-step procedures of availing selected frontline services, service pledge, anti-fixer posters and call cards were distributed to the University's campuses.

Medical and Dental Services

In its desire to maintain the excellent quality of services rendered by its faculty and personnel, the University sees to it that the well-being of its workforce is safeguarded. Aside from providing qualified personnel and modern facilities and equipment in the Medical and Dental Clinic of each campus, the various activities and projects were undertaken by the medical staff in the various campuses as shown in Table 61.

Security Services

The University always aims to provide a safe environment to its community members. With its growing population in its six campuses, the University saw the need to hire more watchmen to ensure the security of the students, faculty, employees, and its physical facilities.

As proof to the excellent performance of its security personnel, only very few cases of minor violence were reported in 2009. Moreover, the security personnel of the University had also contributed to the success of many activities inside and outside of the University premises.

Fire and Earthquake Drill

The Office of Administrative Services and the College of Engineering and Architecture collaborated with one another and with the Bureau of Fire Protection to orient faculty, personnel and students on the basic knowhow in case calamities suddenly strike whether at home or in other places.

On 20 November 2009, OAS and CEA conducted the Fire and Earthquake Exit Drill. The morning session was spent for lectures regarding the chemistry of Fire and discussion of the rules and basic things to remember should such calamities strike.

These topics were tackled by selected officers of the Fire Enforcement Section of the Balanga City Fire Station. The afternoon session took place at the ECE Laboratory Room and the CEA grounds.

During the second part, the participants were made to apply what they learned during the morning session. The students were blindfolded and were put in a simulated fire-stricken area and were made to crawl to look for exit points for their own safety. The facilitators of the activity also taught how to properly use fire extinguishers and the fire hose of the fire truck by individually requiring the participants to extinguish fire.

The said activity was also conducted in the satellite campuses as this will also serve as the initial move towards the establishment of Campus Emergency Groups.

Property and Procurement Services

The present state of the Philippine economy called for the strict implementation of austerity measures in the private and public sector.

In compliance to the call of the national government, the University encouraged all of its offices, colleges, and campuses to be wise in using the University's resources.

Such aims were made possible through educating the workforce on the proper procedures in procuring supplies and materials, hence the activities reflected in Table 63 were conducted.

General Services

The General Services department takes the responsibility in the acquisition, acceptance and inspection, maintenance, safekeeping, utilization and disposal of the University's properties, supplies, and other assets.

In view of the aforementioned responsibilities, it can be claimed that the General Services department did their work well. Through their efforts, the University was able to comply with the call of the national government on the wise management of resources.

special projects

Partne pursued by B the University

artnering with various public and private organizations has always been pursued by Bataan Peninsula State University. It is through creating linkages that the University becomes able to undertake special projects that would not just further glorify its name but would also help the members of the BPSU community to recognize the University's undiscovered potentials.

Projects and Activities BPSU-CICT-HCDG Projects

Having seen the impact of its contribution to the national government's aspiration to promote computer literacy among the teachers and students of public elementary and high schools, the Bataan Peninsula State University continues to implement various ICT projects in the province and the nearby localities in partnership with the Commission on Information and Communications Technology-Human Capital Development Group (CICT-HCDG).

iSchools Project

In order to carry out the objectives of the project, the iSchools team of BPSU sought the granting of the iSchools project package to Samal National High School and the Mariveles National High School-Malaya in Bataan. The same project package was also given to the Cabangan National High School and the Jesus Magsaysay National High School (Sta. Cruz) in Zambales. The team is also finalizing the internet connection and domain name server in order to enable the aforementioned institutions to access the internet and to upload their respective websites.

Likewise, the PHS teachers and students were also oriented on the proper maintenance, recycling and disposal of computer parts. Members of the ISchools team were sent to various trainings such as the Sustainability Planning, Computer and Internet Literacy Course (CILC), Web Development and Library Management.

eSkwela Project

The University contributed a lot to CICT-HCDG's eSkwela Project in terms of finalizing the electronic modules that will be used by the Department of Education Bureau of Alternative Learning System (DepEd-BALS) in its program for out-ofschool youth and adults (OSYA) throughout the country. The University was tapped by CICT-HCDG way back in 2007. Through the eSkwela Content Development Team, composed mostly of the staff of the **BPSU Management Information Systems** Office, modules of the DepEd-BALS were successfully converted into digital format and were also updated in order to suit the needs of the learners.

BPSU identified as Core Team Member for eLearning Project

Out of the 37 SUCs which attended the 4th eQuality Summit in Palawan on September 29 - October 1, 2009, the University was identified to become a member of the Core Team, which will develop and implement the SUC eLearning Enterprise Portal Project. The project aims to set up online collaboration and content development among SUCs for possible offering of distance learning within their respective institutions.

The project opens an avenue of opportunity for BPSU to take steps forward in meeting one of the challenges of the 21st century—a borderless education.

As envisioned in the development plan of BPSU, academic quality and excellence will be pursued by meeting the education standards of the Asia Pacific Region, and this project is a springboard toward that direction. At present there are only few SUCs in the Philippines which offer distance education. President Magpantay believes that BPSU should take an active part in this initiative because it will take BPSU education on a higher level and will boost the competitiveness of the university in the global market.

Human Rights: Nasan Na Yan sa ASEAN?

In December 2008, the University was declared as a Center for Human Rights Education, with Dir. Magdalena A. Abella of the Administrative Services Office being designated as the Chairman of the Committee.

One of the biggest accomplishments of the BPSU-CHRE for 2009 was the conduct of the "Human Rights: Nasan na yan sa ASEAN?" on December 4, 2009 at the Audio Visual Room, BPSU Main Campus. Over 200 participants, coming from various educational institutions participated in the event.

Guests from the CHR Regional Office III stood as resource speakers like Atty. Ray Paolo Santiago and Dr. Remedios Valeria. During the event, the two resource speakers highlighted the salient points on the protection and promotion of Human Rights and the accomplishments of the Philippines and other nations in the Asia-Pacific region.

Establishment of the Aqua-Marine Research Center in Orani, Bataan

In pursuit of attaining sustainable economic development, the University ventured into

aquaculture. As initial move towards the implementation of the aquaculture project, a parcel of land in Kabalutan, Orani, Bataan measuring 10.07 hectares was purchased in the amount of Php 4.3 Million.

The project will benefit students who are majoring in Fisheries course. Moreover, it can also be utilized in initiating a formal entrepreneurial education on aquaculture.

The fishpond was infused with 8,500 bangus fingerlings, 540,000 prawns, and 3,349 crablets on September 15, 2009. These were harvested in December 2009.

Twenty "Lawins" Released in Abucay Wilds

Twenty (20) Brahminy Kites (Haliastur Indus), commonly known as "Lawin" in the vernacular, were released into the wilds of Abucay on 16 July 2009.

The Department of Environment and Natural Resources (DENR), together with Protected Areas and Wildlife Bureau (PAWB) and the Provincial Environment and Natural Resources Office (PENRO) spearheaded the event.

The releasing of the Brahminy Kites was done at the Bataan Natural Park in Bangkal, Abucay, Bataan. University President Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay encouraged the members of the BPSU Administrative Council as well as the faculty and students of the BPSU Abucay Campus to witness the event in order to raise their consciousness and their concern on the preservation of wildlife and natural resources in the country. The event also spurred the desire of the witnesses to establish a sanctuary of endangered species at the Abucay Campus.

Abucay Campus Installs Automatic Weather Station

On February 3-5, 2009, the University, in coordination with the Bureau of Soils and Water Management and Asian Disaster Reduction Center, installed the Automatic Weather Station (AWS) at the BPSU Abucay Campus.

With the equipment installed at Abucay Campus, BPSU will serve as a venue for generation of data to be used for monitoring the climate patterns and for alerting communities which experience frequent occurrence of floods. Data will be gathered in real time collection like rainfall, evaporation, temperature, wind speed and others as an input in agricultural planning, design of water resources development projects and as flood early warning facility especially in downstream areas that are prone to flooding.

Dr. Magpantay Attends 2009 Asian University Presidents Forum

BPSU President Dr. Delfin O. Magpantay attended the 2009 Asian University Presidents' Forum in Hotel Borobudur, Jakarta, Indonesia on October 19-21, 2009.

The forum focused on attaining quality assurance in higher education institutions. The event also highlighted the best practices of various Asian academic institutions and also helped the participants to establish linkages with their international counterparts.

On the part of BPSU, Dr. Magpantay signed memoranda of agreement with the VIT

University in India and the Universitas Negeri Jakarta, Indonesia.

As provided in the InterUniversity Cooperation Agreement, BPSU and the aforementioned universities shall strive to enhance their educational capabilities through initiating academic collaborations in education, research and extension, faculty and student exchange programs and scholarships.

BPSU Hosts PSC Math & Science Technology Fair and Turnover Ceremony

Three hundred and thirty one (331) participants coming from various state universities and colleges in Regions I-IV arrived at the Main Campus of Bataan Peninsula State University to attend the 2009 Math & Science Technology Fair and Turnover Ceremony with the theme "Environmental Awareness through Science and Technology" on December 3-4, 2009.

The event was held at the Bulwagan ng Bayan Annex, Capitol Compound, City of Balanga, Bataan. The first day was reserved for the opening ceremonies and the Math-Science Quiz. In the Math-Science Quiz, the championship title for the Biology Quiz was won by the Bulacan State University while the Central Luzon State University was declared champion in the Physics and Chemistry Quiz.

The University remains properly guided by its Medium Term Development Plan. Through the proper guidance of the University Key Officials and partner agencies, several of the plans of the various offices were attained.

For the University to maintain its smooth operations, each office must be made more aware on the importance of monitoring and evaluating their activities, projects and programs.

The biggest challenge that the University has to face is how it can further improve its performance in the delivery of quality education despite budget cuts.

Improving the faculty profile and the accreditation of programs are some of the concerns that need to be immediately addressed so that BPSU can comply with the requirements of CHED and be able to assure its clients of quality education.

New strategies in the implementation of programs and in improving the performance of students in competitions and licensure examinations must be sought.

BPSU's determination to excel never really wavers; hence, the administration is enjoined to send its workforce to activities wherein they can acquire new ideas and methods that will further enhance their expertise in their chosen field.

Budget cuts may happen now and then and will continue to measure the University's capacity to thrive. Hence, members of the BPSU community are encouraged to be more creative and wiser in the utilization of its resources.

Likewise, the University must strive to increase the number of its IGPs to augment its budget.

Other recommendations deemed to push through the development and success of the University include the following:

- Monitoring of the admission, enrollment, graduation
- Faculty alignment and accreditation of programs
- Improvement of facilities and infrastructure as per recommendations of accreditors
- Conduct of more researches that have community impact
- Establishment of more linkages with local and international organizations
- Enhanced check and balance system to promote the proper utilization of funds and resources
